

Main E-Clubhouse Menu



The master menu at the top allows you to choose which page you wish to work with and the main menu allows you to select the tools to get the job done. The link anchor and button sub menus work in a very similar way to the image sub menu you were using last time. When you want to put a link somewhere on one of your pages you should first assign an anchor for it so that when users are accessing your site the link will stay in the expected area of your webpage. The link submenu allows you to both upload your document and assign information like titling.

The Button submenu allows you to assign a clickable and nameable button to your link. You can also assign an image for clicking on through its submenu

Picture Left : On Thursday, February 1st, our club presented a donation to Sleep in Heavenly Peace. Here in the picture is Lion Joyce Mahovlich, Club Secretary, Jeff Mailloux, Sleep in Heavenly Peace Director and Lion President Tom Trotechaud. The organization's efforts are a 100% volunteer based and donationbased charity. SHP is a registered Canadian Charity on a mission to end the international problem of "Child Bedlessness." Their research shows that between 2% to 3% of all children do not sleep in their own bed. In the Windsor Essex County, there are 195,000 children and out of that population at least 1,900 children are bed less in our community. This organization believes that with food, shelter and clothing being the three necessities of life, a bed falls into the category of shelter as a basic need for the proper physical, emotional and mental support of a child and sleep it helps them prepare to take on the challenges of each day. Since July 2021, the group has built 482 beds and delivered almost all of them which means that same amount of children are no longer sleeping on the floor. With the value of a delivered bed is \$450 (includes bed frame, mattress, sheet set, pillow and comforter) that equates to an investment of \$193,500 of beds into needy homes within Essex County. The organization is the only one in the Province of Ontario so far. They have received requests from Chatham, Ontario but have not been able to supply the necessary beds. The single beds are built for children between the ages of 2 to 17. The Windsor chapter is hopeful that other communities in Ontario will contact them so they can start a group in their area.








Frequently Asked Questions

Receipts?

- Charitable Donation receipts can be issued on request, to individuals only by Y.O.U. (not Lions)

- Businesses can request a Business Acknowledgement Receipt from Y.O.U.
- If Lions get either of these requests, please advise Catherine Dallas, the Fundraising Committee Chair, and she will contact the donor for any information needed by Y.O.U.

Use of Funds Raised?

Funds stay in London & area. If the individual has internet access, check out Y.O.U's website – but if not:

- Temporary Shelter for up to 30 youth (15-30)
- Y.O.U. Centres provide support for basic needs
- Housing Assists to locate and maintain suitable housing
- 340 Project- 6 residential units for youth who have "aged out" of foster care but still need housing with a 24/7 Youth Support Worker
- Career Services Counselling, training and other supports, e.g. Job Board
- Enterprise Services- Y.O.U. operates 5 social enterprises (e.g. YOU Café) with hands on training and employment supports
- Integrated Service Development support to employers and youth during the first year of employment

Why the price?

The per meal cost and use of the Portuguese Club make up over 90% of the ticket price. Attendees also get a chance to win prizes and bid for other items and services – usually at a big saving – and enjoy an evening out that benefits them and the community. Lions are reimbursed ONLY for expenses related directly to the event, but get no other funds raised, as we are a selffunded community (and international) organization.

Why can't I just buy at the door on the night of the event?

The Portuguese Club needs to know at least a week ahead, how many meals are needed, which helps to decide how many tables to set up. Also, by-laws limit the number of people who can be in the room.

How to buy a ticket online?

Contact a London Central member or the Fundraising Chair to tell us how many tickets you need. We deliver in person so we need to know where we can drop them off. Then send an e-transfer for the number of tickets you need (\$55 X #) to: <u>loncentralfundraising@gmail.com</u>



Poplar Hill Lions Club – A Boy Named Marty

Almost four years ago, Marty Ferreira, at age 11, was an active boy playing games outside his home in Poplar Hill, until one night he suddenly woke up sick with a debilitating headache. He was taken to London Health Sciences Centre Children's Hospital, where a scan revealed a parent's worst nightmare, Marty had a brain tumour.

Within days Marty bravely underwent brain surgery and had most, but not all, of this cancerous tumor removed. His journey to recovery was only just beginning. A second brain surgery was performed, and after he recovered, he was scheduled to head to Boston for two months of radiation treatment, five days a week, followed by chemotherapy upon his return.

Naturally, there were immense costs to his two-month stay in Boston. Fortunately, the spirit of our wonderful community of Poplar Hill was there to help this brave boy and his family.

We heard about Marty from another member of the Poplar Hill & District Lions Club, Carey Thody, who knew the family. Together, along with other club members, we started a bottle drive to help cover the costs of Marty's stay in Boston. Although Shannon Cushman, a friend of Marty's mother, was officially running the fundraisers and a GoFundMe page, members of the club played a major role in advertising, directing donations and organizing the bottle drive.

Along with the proceeds of the bottle drive, and \$2,000 raised by a sausage BBQ hosted by the Poplar Hill Lions, the whole fundraiser exceeded its goal of \$25,000 to cover the costs of the trip to Boston for Marty.

At the time of his surgery and radiation therapy, predictions were that he would never walk again. Marty, who turned 15 this past December, is in grade nine at Holy Cross High School in Strathroy, is now walking with some assistance and has a walker at home. He is going to Toronto this month for more physiotherapy and is expected to be there for a month.

All of us at the Poplar Hill & District Lions Club are very happy that we could be part of Marty's journey to recovery, and we would like to thank all those in the community who responded to our fundraising and helped us reach our goal.



Windsor Lions Club established in 1920 continues to advocate and support the official Lions Clubs International Eyeglass Recycling Centre providing recycled eyewear free of charge to people in developing countries.

The Canadian Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centre (CLERC) is located in northeast Calgary in a small, unassuming warehouse. 2023 was the 25th anniversary of the Calgary operations. Stacks of boxes are piled high, each filled with donated eyeglasses from across Canada. Volunteers touch every single pair that arrives to make sure they're good enough to donate to someone in need, just about anywhere in the world. CLERC even finds uses for broken glasses. To date, over 6.3 million pairs of glasses have been used by people in 103 countries. In an optometrist's office, machines would typically evaluate around 150 pairs a month, yet at the (CLERC) location an average of 225-250 are inspected each day.

253 million people are blind or have moderate to severe distance vision impairment (MSVI).

1.1 billion people have near-vision impairment simply because they don't have a pair of glasses.

75% of all blindness and MSVI is avoidable.

89% of people with visual impairment live in developing countries.
