They can load and drop members, enter service into MyLion, order supplies from LCI and monitor the financial issues from LCI. This is a position that all clubs can have and should have if the Officers need help with dealing with MyLCI/MyLion. It can be created by the President or Secretary adding the name to the officer/chair list in MyLCI.

Creating this position should help alleviate the stress on the Secretary and will give you one more trained person on the "New" portal, that's a bonus.

District Meeting Youth Exchange Report November 12, 2023

Last year we had a very successful camp in July 2023 and we are very much looking forward to having another camp in July 2024. Plans are already in motion to have this happen at Camp Sylvan once again as the facility was very accommodating to our needs last year. As I reported earlier we had 7 youth from Europe attend our camp and we would like to grow this year to 10 youth. As everyone is aware the cost of living has gone up and therefore costs for camp have risen as well. As this was the first year for a camp since 2019 some of the increases were incurred.

All A1 Lions Clubs have received my request for funding for camp in 2024 and I have already received some donations and those who have already donated I thank you very for much. If your club has not donated please do so as I require financial assistance to run this camp in the proper manner.

Youth will arrive on Thursday, June 27th, 2024. The first host family will be for 10 days from June 27th to Sunday, July 7th. The second host family will be from Sunday, July 7th to Tuesday, July 16th, at which time camp will start and youth will return to that host family on Thursday, July 25th to Saturday, July 27th which is their departure date. Camp will be from Tuesday, July 16th to Thursday, July 25th, 2024. These dates align our youth arrival, camp and departure dates with the other Districts in MD"A".

I require host families to please come forward so we can bring in 10 youth to our great District. I am looking for commitments to becoming a host family prior to March 1st 2024 so I can commit a camp space to youth who are requesting come. I strongly believe that hosting a youth is a club endeavour and would like to see club involvement with the host family.

The youth were very enthusiastic about our destinations during camp and also thought it was great staying in a camp surrounded by nature!

I am looking forward to coming to your club to show photos and talk about Youth Exchange and how rewarding an experience it can be for everyone involved. Please call me to arrange a time or if you have any questions.

Our kids....

Today's students have endured a lot. Our kids, grand kids and neighbors have struggled sometimes to adjust to ever changing needs and expectations. So how do they deal with this? Anxiety and depression are at all-time highs in our youth. Social media has only compounded the problems. The technology that has opened up communication to the world has isolated our kids to digital communication instead of human connections. How do they deal with the responsibility, the scams, the predators, the bullying, etc. Some will retreat to isolation which brings on feelings of hopelessness, loss of self esteem and sometimes suicidal thoughts. Having been a teacher and coach for over 30 years I've been to many memorials. So what can we do? There is a system designed to train and educate kids from kindergarten to grade 12 and its purpose is to empower kids to identify symptoms, develop self-confidence, advocate for themselves and others, develop leadership skills and most important – know that they are valued and together we are strong. This program was designed by educators and psychologists and is recognized world wide. It is a Canadian ... YES, a Canadian program that helps thousands of children. It is taught in some schools, youth programs and sport organizations. The answer is Lions QUEST. The significant problem we face, to help more kids – our kids, is that since the pandemic the momentum we were gaining has come to a halt, but the needs have multiplied. In South Western Ontario only 17% of our clubs actively support his much needed program. My goal is to shed a light on this program that can have a genuine effect on your communities. We need to have all our clubs make a donation to Lions Quest – A simple donation of \$250 - \$500 a year, will grow this program and help our kids. Talk to your clubs, get the word out, speak to your schools – if they don't have it, we can get it. It all starts with a Question. The Difference Campaign - Make a Difference Today

Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides (LFCDG) mission is to empower Canadians with disabilities to navigate their world with confidence and independence by providing Dog Guides at no cost to them and supporting each pair in their journey together.

Established in 1983 by Lions across Canada, LFCDG was the first school in Canada to specialize in training Guide Dogs for people who are blind or visually impaired. Now, LFCDG is the only service dog school in the world with seven distinct Dog Guide programs (Canine Vision, Hearing, Service, Seizure Response, Autism Assistance, Diabetes Alert, and Facility Support).

From breeding to training to matching, each Dog Guide costs approximately \$35,000 yet is provided at no cost to eligible Canadians from coast to coast and includes a lifetime of follow-up services. LFCDG relies on donations from Lions Clubs, members of the public, and corporations to provide these special matches and does not receive any government funding.

Time to Grow to Meet Demand

With one in five Canadians 15 years of age and up living with one or more disabilities, more Canadians are seeking the services of a specialized Dog Guide. To meet the demand, LFCDG is building a state-of-the-art, purpose-built Dog Guide training school.

Right now, the current facility is not accessible to all clients, the 28 guest rooms are scattered around the building, and there are an insufficient number of classrooms and training areas for each program with uncomfortable learning environments.

What's more, the training spaces are inadequate for Dog Guides to experience situations as a working dog, the kennels and veterinary clinic are at maximum capacity, and the play area is inadequate for Dog Guides.

In contrast, the new school will be fully accessible to all clients and provide many improvements, including a classroom and specific training areas for each program. For Dog Guides, the larger and improved kennel space will provide indoor and outdoor spaces to learn, play, and relax which will increase their well-being to set them up for success in their training.

These improvements will create a more conducive learning environment and provide the best experience possible while creating better outcomes.

The Difference Campaign

To make our dream a reality, LFCDG has launched The Difference campaign, a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to help friends and neighbours in need, by ensuring they can access the support of our loving, loyal, and highly skilled Dog Guides.

LFCDG has already secured \$39 million towards our \$50 million goal. The sale of the current training school and administration office provides \$25M to the building cost. We could not have come this far without the support of many Lions clubs across the country, who have raised \$2.7 million towards the collective Lions club's goal of \$4.5 million. We are so grateful for your generosity.

Your support will help create many more special partnerships, like Anthony with Gambit, who is experiencing safety and increased independence.


